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PLANNING FOR THE CHURCH IN AFRICA FOR THE 1980s

#### EXPLANATIONS OF BISHOP McCAULEY

### Need for planning

In beginning his discussion on the above theme, Bishop Vincent McCauley stressed the point that the Church should not be caught short in abrupt changes. There is a need to be prepared. The interests of the Church must be primary in our thinking. He gave the example of the crisis in Uganda as proof to show we must be prepared.

The one Church must be the concern of all, not individual Dioceses. Bishop McCauley went on to point out that the Religious Congregations are needed to implement Vatican II.

We cannot wait until a crisis shows up to think. We cannot turn aside from things new. We must encourage them, and direct them. We must think about them, try to understand them and adapt them according to our needs. If we don't the Church will be left behind. The Religious Congregations must be prepared for things ahead, for crises.

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#### MISSIONARY COMMITMENT

Following the Board Meeting of Nyegezi in May, 1973, a group of Religious Superiors discussed some aspects of religious life and the missionary commitment today. The following report on this brain-storm session has only private character and is dispatched to the members of the Association for information.

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Many aspects of commitment - There is no doubt there is commitment to MISSION on the part of missionaries but the practical aspects of personal commitment are to be considered.

### On the part of a religious society.

- a) Geographical commitment aspect to a country / diocese / continent, e.i. W. F. to Africa, MM to Far East. Though this pattern is worthy, still the evolution of the modern world limits these original ideals of the founders.
- b) Numerical Commitment.
  - This concept of maintaining or providing a steady increase in numerical strength in various mission field is unrealistic in view of the fall in numbers of Society members and the modern mobility patterns of society generally.
  - The contribution of religious societies will have to be applied more and more to meeting priorities identified by the local church but that cannot be met by the existing personnel resources. However, in those cases all efforts must be made to provide opportunities to local candidates for proper training or in an understudy capacity for replacement of the expatriate at an early date.

#### Personal Commitment.

There are some psychological factors that play an important role in commitment and this must be considered if the expatriate is to make optimum contribution to the churches in the third world. The present day stress on personality fulfillment is affecting strongly the concept of commitment.

- To wit, (1) Whereas young people in the past were committing themselves to the mission apostolate of a society the modern youth seems to be seeking a personal commitment within the Religious Society.
  - (2) Youth seems more committed to a <u>mission ideal</u>, than to local church structures or specific patterns of ministry.
  - (3) The mobility of society general and youth's search for meaningfulness today makes it difficult for many young men to take a permanent and final commitment at an early stage of their Apostolate. It does seem that

societies should offer the possibility of <u>limited commitment</u> with normal possibility of renewal. This "Peace Corps Syndrome" should not be condemmed outright by superiors as a manifestatic of instability. Except for pathological cases of "butterfly mentality", this willingness to meet new Challenges can be an asset as it introduces a flexibility which can be exploited to put together "commando units" to takle thorny problems or exploit favourable situations.

- 4) Youth to-day need a <u>challenge</u> and when the mission field becomes stabilized or somewhat stagnant, some trends emerge:
  - a) One group of missionaries often the older ones settle down to steady apostolate in a known and defined situation which provides fulfillment.
  - b) Another group usually middle-aged nurtures a pioneering mentality which calls for creativity. They often become restless in what they wiew as a stagnant situation.
    - These are normally good organizers who marry drive and maturity. They represent a dynamic core of apostles which the religious superiors and bishops should tap and to whom should be given opportunities for optimum use of their potential.
  - c) The younger missionaries carry to the mission field a generous measure of enthusiasm and idealism. This is admirable, but the increasing limitations to initiative occasioned by the developing political situations and increasing africanization soon become stifling for them.

Some suggestions are herewith outlined for the considerations of superiors to minimize frustration.

- 1. It is imperative that a <u>clear job description</u> be studied by prospective missionaries before their arrival in the country. It would help them to tailor their expectations to the local situation and cushion the inevitable initial acculturation shock.
- When some openings develop for special assignments, it could be beneficial that the post be "advertised" as it were, to seek out suitable and willing candidates. This may give some men an opportunity for satisfying work in a field of interest.
- 3. <u>Limited commitment</u> should become a feature of missionary personnel. Instead of the return to the mission field being automatic and derived from a vague idea of dogodism, a formal renewed commitment would probably prove beneficial.

- 4. If for some reason the bishop and / or the superior deems that the return of a missionary is undesirable, in all fairness, the person concerned should be notified before his departure for home. Thus his right to "due process" will be honoured.
- The Religious Societies should encourage secular priests from the home countries to take limited commitments to the mission apostolate.

  Besides bringing numérical renforcements, this exercise will enrich the personal lives of these volunteers and when they return home will be dedicated promoters of the missionary effort and precious embassadors of the Third World.
- 6. Superiors must recognize that after 10-20 years in the mission field, many of their men experience a sense of weariness difficult to define. Their talk of returning home may be an overt sign that they need a period of "de-carbonizing".
  - This desire on the part of men to re-evaluate their commitment to mission, to restructure their ideals in the light of reality, to scrutinize the gaps between their religious consecration and their mode of living, is real and honest in most cases, and there should be opportunities for up-grading and study, and the possibility of proving to themselves they can still fit in the home situation. In the unstable mission fields of to-day, the missionaries would then feel re-assured that if necessary, re-integration in their home societies would not be the spectre concocted by their imagination. A renewed commitment to the mission field would then be easier and much more satisfying, it being a retional and mature option.
- 7. Regarding the assignment of missionaries in the field, it would seem desirable that appointments be given by diocesan <u>personnel boards</u> of which superiors should be members. It would temper the apparent arbitrariness of nominations by a single person.
- 8. Superiors (& Bishops) must never forget that meaningful dialogue is a key tool for effective administration. Bitterness is a poor launching pad for a fruitful apostolic mission. Generally, religious are willing to be convinced; and this exercise gives them confidence in themselves and adds inches to the stature of the superior in their eyes.
- 9. Religious Superiors, the bishop and the missionaries should have a clear concept of their respective roles in the local church. Unrealistic expectations on the part of anyone can create tensions which make the apostolate a burden.

### - Patterns of Ministry -

There is general agreement that to the local clergy must devolve the growing responsibility for leadership in the Christian community. Some missionary societies or individual missionaries are considering hastening this process by deciding unilateraly to withdraw or phase out in spite of repeated assurances by the bishops that their services

are still required. Some frustrations perhaps arise because of official resistance to their aspirations in up-dating the patterns of Ministry and it is healthy to consider possible / desirable forms of apostolate.

In view of relative scarcity of pastors.

- 1. There seems a case for stressing a new approach to Ministry, namely, that it should increasingly favour the community approach rather than the traditional priest centred organization prevailing in most places.
- 2. Another possibility is the <u>team-method of work</u> whereby a number of pastors live in a communal setting thus proving varied companionship which is lacking in most parishes to-day and their complementary skills can become a new source of efficacious apostolate.
- 3. Great effort should be exerted on developing the local leadership of the Christian communities. At present there is still too much reliance on the priest providing Christian leadership. The absence of a priest should occasion no breakdown in the pattern of workship, only in its form.
- 4. In view of the development of Ujamaa Villages, the "parish fortress" concept should disappear. Small scale parish facilities should be planned on a "mobile" or easily dismantled structures and not on the historical monolithic pattern. The vagaries of water shortages with subsequent shifting of the population would not leave heavy capital investments under-utilized as has happened in many cases. The Christian community is the Church and not an agglomeration of imposing buildings.
- 5. Too often, our approach to mission has been sacramental rather than evangelical. Emphasis must shift from stress on the administration of the sacraments to the encouragement of Christian community life as advocated in the Gospel message.
- 6. It would seem pertinent to redefine the term PARISH specially in or near towns. The canonical parish must remain an administrative unit, but stress placed on Christian life without the constrictions imposed by geographical boundaries. It should be emphasized that the missionary must act as catalyst in initiating change and not attempt to bulldoze the local communities. Our activities must foster growth in the spirit of Vatican II without necessarily precipitating crises in our milieu. Any decision on new patterns of ministry has to be taken by the local church.
